Method-based problem diagnosis

Paul Offord of advance7

Method-based problem diagnosis is rarely understood and even more rarely practiced, and yet it offers an effective means to solving intermittent or long-running IT problems, it is the critical missing element within the Service Delivery toolbox. In this presentation Paul outlines an IT specific problem resolution method called RPR and describes the core principles. He moves on to describes how your company can benefit from the approach and illustrates the effectiveness of RPR with two case studies from the finance industry.
